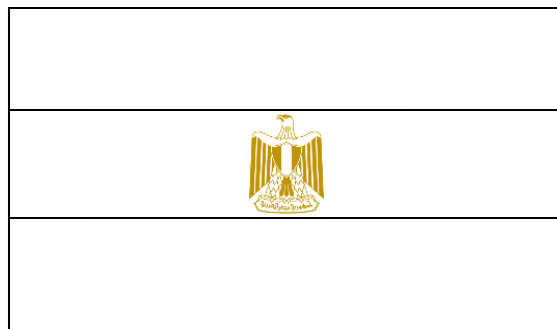

FUN FACTS ABOUT EGYPT

- Egypt is a country in the north-east of Africa.
- The ancient Egyptians settled around the River Nile approximately 5000 years ago and this is the longest river in the world. This lasted for around 3000 years.
- The river was an important source of water in a hot and dry desert landscape.
- They built Pyramids which you can still see there today!
- They wrote using pictures called 'hieroglyphs'.
- The British Museum has the largest collection of Egyptian objects outside of Egypt.
