In Explorers, I learned...



Sticky Knowledge

Key sticky facts to remember:

- The Romans built aqueducts to carry fresh water into towns and cities.
- The Romans developed an understanding of hygiene. Specific public buildings were created so people could keep themselves clean and have a bath.
- Latin was the language spoken by the Romans. It forms part of most modern languages today (etymology).
- Boudicca was a queen of the British Celtic Iceni Tribe who led an uprising against the occupying forces of the Roman Empire.
- When the Romans came to Britain they helped us by creating roads; a written language (which was Latin); introducing coins and even introducing rabbits to our country.
- Hadrian's Wall is a long wall built by the Romans across the north of England. It
 was to keep out the Scots. It is now one of Britain's most famous tourist
 attractions.
- The Romans had an organised army of trained soldiers, which enabled them to conquer different countries and build a large empire.
