

Explorers Summer 2— Beach Combers! Overview, Vocabulary and Sticky Knowledge




In Little Explorers I learned that:

Sticky Knowledge: Beach Combers!

Here are some fabulous facts about our topic Beach Combers.

- A seaside resort has many physical features.
 Features such as the beach, the sea, cliffs and caves have been made naturally. This means they were made by nature.
- Human features found at the seaside might include the pier, the promenade, a lighthouse and a fairground. These features are all man-made.
- In Victorian times, people would travel to the seaside to enjoy activities, such as a puppet show, walk along the promenade or to go sea bathing. The Victorians believed that the sea air was good for you and that sea bathing would make you healthy.
- In the past, beaches were much cleaner because there was less litter. Sadly, now a lot of the oceans are becoming polluted and filled with plastic.
