#### **Spending and Impact Summary**

- We have 19 pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium funding. This is 19% of the school population (this includes some pupils adopted from care).
- We also have 3 pupils in receipt of Forces Premium this is 2.5% of the school population
- We have received £25,520.00 in Pupil/Forces Premium and LAC funding in 2017-18.

#### Reading:

- 15/22 68% of PP pupils met the end of year expectations in reading.
- 18% (4/22) of PP pupils exceeded the expected standard in reading.
- On average, the progress of Pupil Premium pupils in Reading was higher than that of non-Pupil Premium pupils (at +3.41 APS compared with +3.25 APS).

#### Writing:

- 14/22 64% of PP pupils met the end of year expectations in writing.
- 18% (4/22) of PP pupils exceeded the expected standard in writing.
- On average, the progress of Pupil Premium pupils in Writing is in line with that of non-Pupil Premium pupils (at +2.93 APS compared with +2.96 APS).

#### Maths:

- 14/22 64% of PP pupils met the end of year expectations in maths.
- 14% (3/22) of PP pupils exceeded the expected standard in maths.
- On average, the progress of Pupil Premium pupils in Maths was slightly lower than that of non-Pupil Premium pupils (at +3.25 APS compared with +3.05 APS). However, this was still slightly better than expected progress.

The number of children in receipt of Pupil and forces Premium in July 2018 is 22 (19 PP + 3 Forces pupils), which is approximately 19% of the school.

#### Intervention groups and 1:1 support for Pupil & Forces Premium (including LAC) Children 2017-18

All children in receipt of Pupil Premium were identified for some intervention programme or a group targeted on improving their skills throughout the year. This may be in the form of a G&T style group session. Interventions are either 1:1 or in small groups. The provision is altered according to need following pupil progress meetings which are held three times a year.

We are continuing to use Positive Play sessions to support some of our pupils in identified vulnerable groups.

#### Next Year 2018-19

Next year we will receive a similar amount of PP budget. We will have 3 pupils adopted from care, 16 Pupil Premium pupils and 3 Forces pupils. The total funding expected will be £25, 920.00 this is an increase of around £400.00 from last year's budget. This amount may alter throughout the year as we do usually get in-year transfers.
