RM Unify will help you to quickly access the other apps and learning platforms that we use, such as Purple Mash, MyMaths and SeeSaw. It will also have a tile which will take you to Teams, where you can have an online lesson with your teacher.

When using SeeSaw in school, we logon using a shared class QR code.
There are placed around the classroom.





When use SeeSaw at home, we login using our personal Home Learning Code. This is a personal code and should not be shared with others.

Each week, your teacher will upload work to the school website.



Then, click on 'Home Learning'.


Click on 'Children'.

Make sure you click on your class page, then find the correct page for this week.

Your teacher will upload activities onto the Home Learning page on the school website. Each week, there will be a timetable of activities for each day (Mon-Fri) – just like in school! It will tell you what to do, and if there are any videos, websites or presentations to use.

You will then be asked to upload your completed work to your SeeSaw account (just like you do for homework).

You should also make sure you make plenty of time to play, do something creative and stay active.

- 5. Upload this to your 'Home Learning' folder. Wait for your teacher to like your post.

- 1. Login using your Home Learning QR code
- 2. Click on 'Add something' (the green + sign)
- 3. Select photo
- 4. Take a picture of your favourite space on the playground
- 5. Upload this to your 'Home Learning' folder. Wait for your teacher to like your post.

Adding a note

- 1. Login using your Home Learning QR code
- 2. Click on 'Add something' (the green + sign)
- 3. Select note
- 4. Write down 3 sentences about your day so far
- 5. Upload this to your 'Home Learning' folder. Wait for your teacher to like your post.

Don't Meet Up


Meeting someone
